The Lord Is My Shepherd

It's one of the best known and most loved psalms in the Bible. The 23rd Psalm, sometimes called "the shepherd's psalm" has provided comfort and peace for its readers throughout the centuries. While this beautiful text continues to be a favorite of so many, it is likely that much of its deepest imagery and meaning are lost on those of us who are unfamiliar with sheep and the ancient work of shepherding.

For sheep, who lacked so many of the natural defenses and abilities that so many other members of the animal kingdom depend on, the wilderness in which they grazed was a very dangerous place. They were constantly threatened by everything from poisonous plants and rushing waters to treacherous paths and lurking predators. If left unattended, any one of those hazards would surely mean their quick demise. For this reason, the shepherd played a vital role in the business of raising sheep, serving as provider, protector, caregiver, leader, and companion to the flock. The 23rd Psalm paints a beautiful picture of this complex relationship and uses that picture to teach us about God's constant care for us.

The world in which we live can be very dangerous and frightening. We continually encounter forces, both physical and spiritual, that are powerful and destructive and that threaten to overcome us on a daily basis. Trials and tribulations surround us and we are often powerless to withstand them alone. Thankfully, we do not face this world and its challenges alone. With David, we can confidently proclaim, "the Lord is our shepherd." In our weakness, He is our strength. In our helplessness, He is our help. In our emptiness, He fills us up. In our fear, He is our courage. Like a shepherd with his sheep, the Lord is our constant provider, protector, caregiver, leader, and companion. In His presence, we have all that we need and lack for nothing. While the Lord's presence does not mean that we will not face trials and temptations, it does mean that we will never face those things alone. His power, wisdom, and love are always with us to meet our needs and to give us the victory.
