Restoring Hope

In the book of 2 Samuel 4, we are introduced to the character of Mephibosheth. He was Jonathan's son and King Saul's grandson. He was royalty and would be well cared for throughout his lifetime. Yet in 2 Samuel 4:4, everything comes crashing down for young Mephibosheth in this single verse. In verse 4, we find out that Mephibosheth, at the age of 5, looses his dad and grandad in battle. Furthermore, for fear of eliminating the royal family we see Mephibosheth's nurse pick up the young boy and begin fleeing for their lives. Consequently, we read that because of her fear and urgent flight Mephibosheth falls and becomes crippled for the rest of his life.

Within minutes Mephibosheth's life would be forever changed by a single moment. Mephibosheth's story picks back up 20 years later in 2 Samuel 9. In the beginning of the chapter, David sits upon the throne of Israel and his mind flashes back to the royal family and his friendship with Jonathan. David asks if there was anyone left from the house of Saul. Notice the purpose of his inquiry though. 2 Samuel 9:1, "... that I may show him kindness for Jonathan's sake." 20 years ago Mephibosheth's nurse fled in fear believing the king would try to eliminate the royal family, though we see quite a different viewpoint from David.

As the story goes on David hears that Jonathan's son still lives and can be found in the lowly and poverty stricken town of Lo-debar. David summons his men and brings Mephibosheth back to the palace. Upon arrival Mephibosheth falls on his face and tells David that he would be his servant. In 9:7, David responds, "Do not fear, for I will show you kindness for the sake of your father Jonathan, and I will restore to you all the land of Saul your father, and you shall eat at my table always." According to verse 13, from that day forward Mephibosheth's hope was restored and he was given all that was promised by David.

Take a moment and evaluate your life. Have we allowed a moment/s to define our future? For Mephibosheth he looses the ability to walk based upon a false assumption of his caretaker. The assumption turned into fear which led to flight and resulted in deformity for Mephibosheth. For the next 20 years Mephibosheth lives in poverty and struggles to survive. One moment, one decision, one action changed the course of his life. This same process can ring true in our own lives. Is there a moment that has defined you as an individual? Perhaps it is a past decision or sin that people remember. Maybe it was disagreement between a loved one that severed the relationship. It could have been a misunderstanding that never was handled properly. Whatever moment/s you have endured remember that there is hope in Christ. Psalms 103:8-13 is an excellent text for us to examine concerning hope and forgiveness. Let us all consider these words and not allow the negative moments in life to define us. May God bless you in your walk with Christ.
