The Value and Danger of Tradition

Humans are, by nature, drawn to traditions. We have traditions in society, in our families, in our own personal lives, and yes, in the church. Over the last couple of years, many of our traditions in the church have been challenged (meeting schedules, passing communion trays, etc.), and our leaderships have been challenged to answer tough questions about how we proceed moving forward. All of this has led to an intensifying of the debate over traditions and their place in the church. On one side, there are those who seem to be opposed to traditions simply because they are traditions, and on the other side, there are those who hold traditions to be as sacred as doctrinal commands. With all of this in mind, consider both the value and danger of traditions in the church.

Traditions can be valuable. They give us anchor points and provide familiarity, routine, and comfort. I would also suggest that traditions (i.e. ongoing and repeated patterns and practices) are an inevitable and necessary part of any church structure. Without those regular schedules and repeated practices that quickly become traditions, chaos would quickly ensue. Traditions are a part of our identity and are important to our cohesiveness and fellowship.

Traditions can be dangerous. You need look no further than the Pharisees of Jesus' day to see this truth (read Matthew 15:1-9). The danger of traditions is that they can become so deeply engrained in our practice and in our minds that the lines between doctrine and opinion become blurred. When this occurs, we can become guilty of stubbornly holding to a tradition even if that practice is no longer conducive to the edification and growth of the church, and often to the point of causing division among the brethren. Traditions must be handled carefully.

So what is the solution to this debate? Since it is one that has been ongoing for thousands of years, it would be incredibly foolish for me to suggest that I know the answer, but let me offer a couple of suggestions:

- We must maintain a clear understanding of the distinction between matters of doctrine and matters of tradition. Doctrine is from God and is not up for debate. Traditions are from man and can be held or changed as the need arises and as the eldership deems appropriate.
- All discussions and decisions with regard to traditions must be carried out in love. My devotion to a tradition must never be greater than my love for my brethren or for the Lord's church. Consider the inspired words of the apostle Paul: "Therefore, let us pursue the things which make for peace and the things by which one may edify another." (Romans 14:19)
