

The disciples spent much time together. When I think about their relationships I often wonder about the deep conversations they must have had as they traveled place to place on foot.

We know of one such conversation that took place on the way to Capernaum. As they came into Capernaum and met up with Jesus He asked them about what they were discussing. Interestingly, Jesus being all knowing knew what they were discussing, He was using this as an opportunity to teach. The disciples did not answer Jesus, instead choosing to remain quiet.

Jesus, knowing what had been discussed as they traveled the road toward Capernaum, called the twelve apostles to Him and said, "If anyone be first, he must be least of all and servant of all." What Jesus says here is truly remarkable, it runs contrary to how the rest of the world views greatness. In the eye of the world, greatness is found in things such as financial success, popularity, and even good looks.

Jesus taught that greatness comes by choosing to be the least and a servant. This is a difficult thing for us to strive for because it seems to be counterintuitive. It might also be difficult because of our understanding of what it means to be "least." Being least does not mean you are at the bottom of the pile or back of the pack per se. It is not a matter of importance vs. unimportance.

The one who chooses to be least is one who has the kind and humble attitude desired of those in the kingdom of God. The one who is the least does not feel himself or herself too important for any task that requires doing in the church.

Being least in the kingdom is not

about being last on some sort of hierarchy. It is not about a lack of being important. Instead, being the least is about choosing to follow in the footsteps of Jesus Christ (Philippians 2:6-7).

It was Jesus who washed the feet of the Apostles to leave them (and us) an example (John 13:1-17), it was Jesus who associated with those considered "sinners" (Mark 2:15-17), it was Jesus who gave His life up, considered Himself least, because others needed Him.

When we seek to become great, let each of us pray to become least.

Today is Fathers Day, when we celebrate the men in our lives who have molded us and been there for us our whole lives. Fathers are intended to provide and protect and we are thankful when they do. Even more so, we have a heavenly Father who also has molded us, who has been there for us our whole lives. Who has provided for us and protected us. How much more worthy of celebration is our heavenly Father who is perfect, than our earthly fathers who, as much as we may love and care for them, are not.

If God were to tell us what it was that He would want us to celebrate about Him on Fathers Day, what would He say?

- Would He say to celebrate Him by worshipping Him in spirit and in truth (John 4:24)?
- Would He say to celebrate Him by loving the Lord God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind (Luke 10:27)?
- Would He say to celebrate Him by listening to His beloved Son, in Whom He is well pleased (Matthew 17:5)?
- Would He say to celebrate Him by sharing the gospel (His power) without being ashamed because it has the power to save men (Romans 1:16)?
- Would He say to celebrate Him by befriending His Son, by obeying His commands (John 14:15)?
- Would He say to celebrate Him by being unified in spiritual matters so that the world might believe that He sent His Son (John 17:21)?

I think we know that all of these questions would be answered, "Yes." God would want to be celebrated through these means because of the relationship they establish between our heavenly Father and us, His children (Galatians 3:26-27).

Evangelism challenge:

- How comfortable are you with sharing your faith with others?
- o Is it something that you consciously think about doing or does it happen naturally?

Risking our relationships by talking about God can be extremely uncomfortable, and I would say with some exceptions, most of us do not do it naturally. It is a habit and a desire that we must cultivate and put effort into establishing.

Remember, I love you in the Lord and want to go to heaven with you.
